

# Wanted: A Few Good Men and Women.

Every organization needs a dedicated staff to keep things running smoothly. The Perinton Historical Society has been fortunate over the years to have a group of people who have helped to make this Society run like a well oiled machine on a day to day basis.

A committee study chaired a few years ago by T.C. Lewis, concluded that there was a core group of twelve people who kept the Society running. Recently, we have had some departures from this core group who have not been replaced. There are now only 7 people or positions left that were identified in this report that are running the Society and the Board is having a hard time finding dedicated long term leaders to fill these positions.

The mission of the Perinton Historical Society is to promote community interest in the preservation of local records and artifacts for posterity, and for the enlightenment of the Perinton Community.

The Perinton Historical Society is not a flashy organization and our traditional method of asking people the Board feels are qualified or obtaining leaders by word of mouth has not been effective in recent years. We have

found that recent retirees and other people, who we have approached, are volunteering at other organizations or don't have the time they thought they would after they retired.

Our request last year for volunteers was met with an enthusiastic response from members of the Society, but now we are in need of leaders to direct these volunteers and complete projects here at the museum. The following is a short description of leadership positions. More detailed job descriptions will be attached to you membership renewal in August.

- Maintenance Coordinator. (day to day operation, more than one person could apply. Retirees preferred.) Maintain supplies, set up meeting room, clean up after meetings, and seasonal building changes.
- House Tour Coordinator. (January to October, more than one person preferred.) Find 4 houses for the tour, organize house captains, press releases and photographs.
- Newsletter Editor. (8 issues, August to May, more than person can apply.) Compose text and keep the membership informed of events.
   Another committee sends out the newsletters upon completion.
- Membership Coordinator. (Computer knowledge not required but it does make the job much easier, year round, also organizes the newsletter mailing August to

- April. More than one person may apply.)
- Gift Shop Account Manager.
   (Quarterly report, 1 person only. 4 days a year.)
- Board of Trustees. (5 year term, monthly meeting 7:00 PM 3<sup>rd</sup>
   Tuesday from September to April, more than one person, you will be put on a list for consideration. 7 meetings a year.)
- Executive Committee. (1 year term, various positions. Immediate need for President and 1st Vice President. 7 meetings a year)

When you receive you renewal form in the mail this August, take a look at our leadership applications and consider signing up for one these important positions. You will be invited to a Board of Trustees meeting and given an opportunity to meet the Board members and get a feel of how things are done in the organization.

We need to pull together to keep this Society a strong working organization in the community.

# Historic Recipes.

This is a series of articles of favorite recipes from women who lived or are still living in Perinton and Fairport, as well as, recipes from local business advertisements and cook books. Biographical information was collected by Fairport Museum volunteers.

The pinnacle of food preparation is to have one of your recipes endorsed by a national publication.

In 1936, Mrs. Ralph Wilson of 58 East Church Street, Fairport was awarded a certificate of Recipe Endorsement by *Better Homes*  and Gardens magazine for her recipe Noodles and Tuna. She received signed copies of her endorsed recipe bearing the Better Homes and Garden stamp of approval.

The recipe passed the magazine's test kitchens for dependability, taste and family usefulness. The Fairport Herald Mail reported that "In awarding these certificates, it is the magazine's aim to provide proper recognition for the creative work done by women in their own kitchens...".

If you get a chance, try this award winning local recipe.

## **Noodles and Tuna**

1 six ounce package of noodles

1 can tuna (about 7 ounces)

1 cup milk

1 can mushroom soup
Cook the noodles in boiling,
salted water until tender,
then drain, rinse and drain
again. Rinse the tuna in
cold water, add the milk
and mushroom soup and
heat to boiling. Remove
from the stove, add the
noodles and place in a
greased baking dish. Bake
in a moderate oven (350
degrees) for about 20

minutes or until brown. Remove from the oven and serve hot from the baking dish. Serves six.
