A Tribute to Peter J. McDonough; politician, preservationist and long time member of the Perinton Historical Society

Peter J. McDonough passed away March 26, 2010 at the age of 83. Everyone knew Peter as a politician. He was mayor of the village of Fairport from 1971 to 1981 and served in the Monroe County Legislature. What is not commonly known is Peter's historic preservation activities and his role in moving the Perinton Historical Society museum from the Crosman Center to our current location on Perrin Street.

Peter loved antiques and anything old. He enjoyed telling the story of when he was first married. His new bride Bernadette sent him to the store to buy food for dinner and he returned home with an antique instead of groceries. The Perinton Historical Society and Fairport Museum were a perfect fit for both Peter and Bernadette. The couple moved to Fairport in1969 and joined the society at the annual meeting that same year. Peter preferred to support the society from behind the scenes. In contrast Bernadette took a leadership role and was on the Executive Committee and Board of Trustees for over 30 years. Over the years the McDonoughs have donated several items for the museum collection and have always participated in Society events.

In 1970 Peter McDonough ran against Gordon Murphy for mayor of Fairport. A major plank in Peter's platform was to save the Main Street Lift Bridge from demolition for urban renewal.

McDonough won the election, saved the bridge, and served as village mayor until 1981.

The Urban Renewal Agency was established in Fairport in 1965. By the middle of the 1970s studies had been completed and options were being discussed over how to proceed with a plan to revitalize the village. In 1976, Peter McDonough with the support of the village board, hired the Landmark Society of Western New York to conduct a house and building survey of structures in the village of Fairport. The survey was done to record and document the historic structures in the village and to better understand the built environment before making final decisions for renovations. Staff of the Landmark Society took photos and collected historical facts on structures in the village that were 50 years old or more. This 10 volume collection is still considered one of the best surveys ever done by the Landmark Society. Copies of this important report are still used today by researchers in the Fairport Museum.

The moving of the Fairport Public Library to the new Village Landing Mall created an opportunity to establish a local museum in the village. Peter worked with the village board, the Fairport School District, and executives at the Perinton Historical Society to broker a deal which brought the Society's collections from a single room at the Crosman Center to the former library on Perrin Street. In 1979 volunteers from the Perinton Historical Society moved their collections to the former library and established the Fairport Historical Museum. Peter along with other members of the Society moved all the artifacts and documents to the new facilities. Some people still remember Peter McDonough and Al Knapp riding down East Ave. on Fred Potter's vintage tandem bi-

cycle on their way to the museum.

In 2006 the First Baptist Church was in jeopardy of being sold and razed for a drug store. Peter McDonough helped form an organization that advocated for a preservation ordinance in the village to save the church and other historic buildings in Fairport. There was an analogy Peter used to help explain the relationship between Fairport's historic buildings and the village's heritage. Peter explained that Fairport was like a three legged stool with the legs represented by the Main Street Lift Bridge, the Green Lantern Inn and the First Baptist Church. Remove one of the legs and the stool would not stand, and the removal of one of the key historical buildings would devastate the historic feel of the village.

That same year, Peter took a leadership role in the Perinton Historical Society for the first time. He was appointed President of the Society by the Board of Trustees. Through his efforts, the Perinton Historical Society took a stand in support of a preservation ordinance and established an Historic Buildings Committee within the Society to record and promote historic properties in the village. Fairport passed a preservation ordinance in 2007 and the Historic Buildings Committee has updated the 1976 Landmark Society Survey and is pursuing several other projects.

Peter McDonough will be missed but his legacy lives on both in the village of Fairport and at the Fairport Historical Museum.
